AMO PROGRAMME ACQUIRES NEW MACHINERY TO BOOST PRODUCTION.

AMO Programme has expanded its production capacity with the installation of three new woodworking machines at its workshop in Abepotia. The equipment, which includes a belt sander, scroll saw, and cross-cutting machine, arrived on July 30. It was installed on August 2, and staff orientation on how to use it was completed on August 7.

The new machines are expected to significantly enhance the precision, speed, and efficiency of producing locally made wooden learning materials for schools.

According to the organisation, this upgrade will allow for faster order fulfilment, improve material quality, and the development of more intricate, child-friendly designs.

As AMO celebrates its 30th anniversary, the organization says the equipment upgrade comes at a pivotal time, aligning with its mission to serve more schools, educators, and communities with hands-on educational resources.

The acquisition was made possible with support from the ABACUS Foundation, which facilitated the timely delivery of the machines.

"This investment strengthens our production capacity and enable us to continue providing quality learning tools for children across Ghana and beyond," said Kwaku Kwakye, Production Manager at AMO.



AMO PROGRAMME ANNOUNCES VAT EXEMPTION ON ITS EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS FOLLOWING NαCCA ACCREDITATION.

AMO Programme is pleased to announce to all its valued customers that, with immediate effect, purchases of AMO's educational materials will no longer include Value Added Tax (VAT).

This important change follows the recent accreditation of AMO's products by the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NaCCA), which was granted on MAY 2, 2025, confirming that AMO's materials meet national curriculum standards.

As a result, under Ghana Revenue Authority regulations, AMO Programme is now officially exempted from charging VAT on its approved learning resources.

A LIFE DEDICATED TO EDUCATION - MEET MS. VIDA BARBARA NTOW (BOARD MEMBER).

Ms. Vida Barbara Ntow, a distinguished educator and advocate for Early Childhood Education (ECE), has concluded an impressive career spanning over three decades within Ghana's education sector. She began her journey in 1989 after graduating as a Cert 'A' teacher from the Presbyterian College of Education, Aburi. Over the years, she served in several teaching roles in Dunkwa-On-Offin and Koforidua before advancing her studies in Special Education and Home Economics at the University of Education, Winneba.

Ms. Ntow's dedication saw her rise steadily through the ranks from teacher to administrator, and ultimately, to the national level. After completing her MPhil in Special Education in 2008, she transitioned to administrative roles, first at the Regional Education Office in Koforidua and later at the GES Headquarters in Accra. There, she served as the Director for Early Childhood Education, where she led major reforms and programs aimed at strengthening the ECE sector.



She is credited with developing key national resources including the Early Childhood Education Policy Framework, KG National INSET Package, and Family Community Engagement Guidelines. Her work also involved extensive national training initiatives, international conference participation, and forging partnerships with both government and nongovernment stakeholders.

In her later years of service, Ms. Ntow developed a close working relationship with AMO Programme. As a board member, she was instrumental in bringing AMO Programme on board for the Lively Minds

program in Northern Ghana, ensuring the provision of quality, locally produced learning materials.

"What keeps me going is the belief that one day, government will fully support and patronize locally produced materials from AMO Programme for all KG schools in the country making play-based learning a true reality."

She retired from active service in 2023, leaving behind a legacy of innovation, leadership, and unwavering dedication to the future of Ghana's children.
